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Rise, Fall, and Faithfulness: What Truly Endures in a Changing World

ahalo ke Akua — gratitude has a way of sharpening our vision by helping us see God's faithfulness more clearly amid the busyness of the holidays. As I reflect on this past year—the challenges, the lessons, and the ways God has sustained us—I'm reminded how Scripture continues to shape lives here in Hawaii through the ministry of Bible Institute

of Hawaii and our dedicated faculty, volunteers, and partners in biblical education.

As 2026 approaches, we're stepping into a remarkable milestone: **the 250th anniversary of the United States**—a semiquincentennial. It's a quarter of a millennium. Historians note that the average lifespan of a world power is about 250 years. [sigh] Now, before you make a run to Costco and hoard all the toilet paper—relax. It's not prophetic.

And yes, planners are already thinking ahead: the 500th anniversary would be called the *Quincentennial*, complete with its own time capsule. But we've got the current 250-year milestone to celebrate first.

When America was signing the Declaration of Independence in 1776, these islands were still governed by independent chiefdoms under the traditional kapu system—a time marked by shifting alliances, ruthless betrayal among rival chiefs, and clashes for control to no end. as historians often note. It would be another nineteen years before a future king—Kalani Pai'ea Wohi o Kaleikini Keali'ikui Kamehameha o 'Iolani i Kaiwikapu kau'i Ka Liholiho **Kūnuiākea** (Kekoolani Genealogy Database, n.d.)—would unite them in 1810. Yes, that was a shortened version. (Imagine Jason Momoa using Kamehameha's full name in Chief of War; the opening credits would need two episodes.) After Kamehameha's unified kingdom was established, it would be another eighty-three years before a foreign power overthrew the monarchy in 1893, and five years later Empires rise and become formidable, yet they eventually fall—a 100% track record since recorded history began proves that point. Even today's "superpowers" have their Kryptonite and

eventually face the same fate. So, what truly lasts when even the mighty fade? And what does a life look like when its direction is shaped by faith—or by the lack of it? The answer comes into focus when you look at the life of Asa...

Asa: From Strong Start to Enduring Lesson

In our last session of *Just Show Up – Public Reading of Scripture*, we ended with a lesser-known story of King Asa (2 Chronicles 14–16). Asa didn't

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fail at the start line. He stumbled in the middle miles. His story reminds us—faithfulness isn't a sprint. It's endurance.

Asa began well. He tore down idols, obeyed the Lord, and led the people through spiritual reform. Judah's King Asa cried out to God:

"O Lord, there is none like You to help, between the mighty and the weak. Help us, O Lord our God, for we rely on You." (2 Chronicles 14:11, ESV)

And God answered—decisively. The victory was complete. But years later, facing a smaller threat from the **northern kingdom of Israel**, Asa panicked. He emptied the Temple treasury and bought a military alliance with Aram instead of trusting the Lord (2 Chronicles 16:2–3).

That is when a prophet named **Hanani** confronted him with one of Scripture's most searching lines, "For the eyes of the Lord run to and fro throughout the whole earth, to give strong support to

those whose heart is blameless toward Him." (2 Chronicles 16:9, ESV)

Was this a warning that God's searching eyes were now looking elsewhere—away from Asa? *Yikes*.

Then, when disease struck his feet, Scripture says, "Even in his disease he did not seek the Lord, but sought help from physicians." (2 Chronicles 16:12, ESV) Hmm...

Ironic, since Asa's very name may come from a Hebrew root meaning "healer" or "physician." Some scholars suggest his "diseased feet" mirrored his spiritual walk—a warning for all of us who begin with zeal but lose focus along the way and neglect our spiritual longevity.

Paul wrote in **1 Corinthians 3:11:** "For no one can lay a foundation other than that which is laid, which is Jesus Christ."

You can build with gold or straw, marble or marshmallows—only one foundation lasts. Kingdoms are overthrown and constitutions may crumble, but God's promises never expire.

Speaking of Longevity

This February—as the Lord wills—we will celebrate Miss Ada Lum's centenarian birthday, being 100 years young—our beloved Emerita who has inspired, prayed for, and poured into generations of students at Bible Institute of Hawaii. Personally, I was deeply impacted by her teaching ministry and impressed by her unhurried style—never in a rush to rattle off facts, but attentive to every detail of

the living text. She has honed a skill that outpaces many seasoned teachers: using reflective pondering and vivid imagery that drew me in time and time again.

Ada inspired a generation, and many of our faculty at Bible Institute of Hawaii continue that same legacy. She is also our **Lifetime Achievement Award** recipient—and deservedly so. Her faith was active and unwavering, producing a lifetime of ministry.

Her celebration will be held **Saturday**, **February 28** | **10:30 AM** – **1:30 PM**, with lunch and a celebratory program at **Kalihi Union Church Gym**. I think you noticed that "Asa" and "Ada" differ by only one letter—but that small difference tells a big story. Asa—whose name means "healer"—began well but drifted from the One who truly heals. Ada, whose name carries the sense of "noble" or "adorned," has faithfully adorned Christ's Word through her life and ministry. One letter apart, yet their lives show very different paths: Asa's story fades, while Ada's legacy shines.

At Bible Institute of Hawaii, we enter the new year with a sharpened vision:to be a leading institute for biblical literacy in Hawaii and the Pacific, accessible to all who seek to grow in Christ.

Understanding and Reaching People with Other Beliefs

his past fall quarter, I participated in Dr. Pat Zukeran's BIH Class "Another Gospel: Identifying and Engaging Cult Groups" at Mililani Community Church (also offered online). It's convenient to attend online, but even nicer to meet, fellowship, and share delicious snacks with the warm and friendly Bible Institute and Mililani Community Church congregation students!

Every class was full of informative and interesting facts and personal stories from Dr. Zukeran's wealth of knowledge and experiences. From my perspective, I had not known much about what Jehovah's Witnesses, Mormons, or any of the "other gospels" believed until Dr. Zukeran's teachings. The historical origins were fascinating—surprisingly, many of these groups originated in the United States of America during the 1800s.

Regarding their theology, for example, Mormonism teaches that God was once a man who became exalted and that men can become gods through obedience and righteousness. They also believe that Jesus and Satan are spirit brothers, and that faithful men may one day become gods of their own celestial kingdoms. Jehovah's Witnesses, on the other hand, deny the full divinity of Christ and instead teach that He is a created being. This clearly contradicts Scripture: "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God" (John 1:1), and Jesus' own words, "Before Abraham was born, I am" (John 8:58).



Each of these "cults" uses certain
Scriptures to justify their beliefs but
ignores others that contradict them.
They also have their own writings or
books—such as the Book of Mormon and
The Watchtower—which they consider as
sacred as the Bible. Thankfully, none of
these writings have been authenticated
like the Bible, which has been historically reliable and divinely inspired.
"All Scripture is God-breathed and is
useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting,
and training in righteousness"
(2 Timothy 3:16).

It was also interesting to learn how Jehovah's Witnesses study the Bible and can quote Scripture very well. Taking this class really put into perspective how important it is for every believer to read, memorize, and study the Bible so that the truth of God's Word is firmly rooted in our hearts. "I have hidden your word in my heart that I might not sin against you" (Psalm 119:11), and Jesus said, "You will know the truth, and the truth will set you free" (John 8:32).

I'm thankful for the tips Dr. Zukeran gave on how to speak to those in "other gospels," especially the suggestion to ask gentle, thoughtful questions and always speak with love and understanding. "Always be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the hope that you have. But do this with gentleness and respect" (1 Peter 3:15).

I hope that every Christian believer can take a BIH class like this to grow in discernment, understand what others believe, and be equipped to lovingly reach out to those who follow teachings apart from the true Gospel of Jesus Christ. "Even if we or an angel from heaven should preach a gospel other than the one we preached to you, let them be under God's curse" (Galatians 1:8). We are saved by grace through faith alone in Jesus Christ—"For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith—and this is not from yourselves, it is the gift of God-not by works, so that no one can boast" (Ephesians 2:8-9).

We are saved by grace through faith alone in Jesus Christ, and this class inspired me to lovingly share that truth with others who are still searching for the real Gospel message.
